May your New Year's Resolution be to grow in God's Word

Clergy Thoughts As I am sitting to write this, a major snowfall is forecast for the next few days. I have recently returned from an extended vacation to Australia, New Zealand, and Fiji. Having left Canada in mid October and returning about ten days ago, it was interesting to see the preparations for Christmas in the other countries, and I found myself contemplating how much of what we do is tradition and how much is authentic to Christmas.

Being in Australia the first three weeks of November, I saw a few signs of Christmas approaching. The grocery stores had fruit cake and mince tarts, but I saw very few decorations for sale. Perhaps there would be four or five feet of one aisle. Nor were the stores decorated as they are here. The windows were not filled with advertisements to buy for Christmas, and someone told me I was too early for Christmas preparations. Not so in Canada. A clerk in a store told me today they are receiving Valentine and Easter things now, along with summer stock. Preparations for Christmas seem to start in Canada as soon as Halloween is over.

Many of the beaches I saw were what I considered deserted with only a handful of people per mile of beach. The campgrounds were busy, but I had no problems finding a site. Campground operators told me that Christmas will see them overflowing, and as the management they get no time to celebrate the holiday. Some may stay home to have Christmas Day with family and friends, but the next week finds most everyone at the beach.

The last week of November I moved to New Zealand where the coming of Christmas was more evident, but it was still very subdued compared to what I knew it would be here at home. Again I was told the beaches would be packed for Christmas and a town of seven hundred fifty residents would swell to fifteen thousand. Beaches that had perhaps a dozen people then would be packed for the holidays. People in New Zealand hope for a hot Christmas in the same way we hope for a white Christmas. Christmas dinner is most likely a barbeque or perhaps a cold picnic on the beach as it is too hot to cook.

As I travelled through Auckland from the airport to a hotel, we passed Farmers Department Store. On the corner of their building was a Santa standing four stories high with a three story high reindeer on each side of him. Santa was in his traditional red with white fur. When I commented about the fur in the warm climate I was informed it was traditional.

Since it got dark about eight thirty or nine in the evening and light again around six in the morning, lights are not as popular there as here. I did see one home that had Santa on the roof on his surf board, and the house was outlined in blue lights to represent the water.

Fiji was my destination for the first week of December. The hotel lobby was decorated with red rope like I would see here and a tree had been erected. Interestingly, the tree was not native to the area but identical to what we would use. "Winter Wonderland" was playing on the loudspeaker system. Obviously they were catering to the tourists, but to my knowledge only two of us were Canadian and there were numerous Aussies and Kiwis. For a few nights there was a large contingent of Poles. Although I met a few Americans, the North Americans were very definitely in the minority, yet were the target audience of the decorations.

While in Fiji I made two trips to Sigatoka, the local town. There were more decorations there than in Australia or New Zealand, but I still found it subdued. In one store there were index cards taped to the underside of the glass cases of watches "layaway for Christmas", but Christmas was not promoted as customary in Canada.

I was told Christmas is very important in Fiji and Christians recognize it for its religious significance. A non-Christian presence was very visible, and apparently everyone, Christian or non-Christian, celebrates the day with a big meal. Fijians take the day as an opportunity for family to get together whether they recognize our Saviour or not.

What I found interesting was the traditional tree and a clerk folding Santa suits like we would see here. I recalled the large Santa in Auckland, and I found myself wondering how much of what we do is merely because it is traditional. Our meal of ham or turkey, our decorations in our homes, our shopping and gift giving, perhaps even our attendance at church could be more tradition than remembrance of what the day means. Realizing the reason for the celebration is the birth of Christ, do we celebrate as we do because of who Christ is and what He has done, or do we merely consider it a chance to have a family meal together? Do we think about how our Christmas routines remind us of Christ's birth?

The Messiah came to earth so He could teach us about God the Father; about a God who demands punishment for sin but Who is also merciful, loving, and forgiving. Jesus came so he could bear our pain, so He could die on the Cross for our sake, so He could pay the penalty God demands. He came so we may have eternal life with Him and God the Father. Without Easter there is no Christmas. If Jesus had not died on the Cross for our sins He would have been merely another prophet. But He did die for us; He is much more than another prophet, He is God humbling Himself to come unto us in human form. Thanks be to God for his most wonderful gift of his Son to us at Christmas and for what Jesus did for us at Easter. Let us remember the reason we celebrate both of these important holidays.



The word **TRINITY** itself does not appear in the Bible; but the Bible clearly teaches that there is only one God and this one God exists as one essence in Three Persons. The three Persons are: God the Father, God the Son (Jesus Christ) and God the Holy Spirit (also called the Holy Ghost.)

1. The all-inclusive triangle represents **GOD** in His fullness.

2. The three triangles whose apexes reach the apexes of the all-inclusive triangle represent GOD the Father, GOD the Son and GOD the Holy Spirit.

3. The centre of the all-inclusive triangle is intersected by the three triangles representing **the Persons of the Godhead**. This "centrality" represents the one essence and three Persons of the Trinity.

4. Within the three triangles, three identical features are listed: (1) in status, each is **Lord**; (2) in attribute, each is **holy**; (3) in relationship to humanity, each is **life-giving**.

5. The small "blank" triangles formed by the intersection of the three larger triangles indicate the work and Persons of the Trinity, although distinguished, are never separated.

6. The small triangles, labeled "God in Totality" are within the all-inclusive triangle. These indicate that often GOD is spoken of in Scripture in contexts that do not emphasize a Person in the Godhead; rather, they emphasize GOD in His fullness. (This, of course, does not mitigate the Persons of the Trinity.)

7. Pease study all scriptures found within the all-inclusive triangle. Match the numbers in the diagram with the explanation numbers.

The CREED of SAINT ATHANASIUS, found on P. 695 - 698 in the Anglican Book of Common Prayer, is traditionally ascribed to **Saint Athanasius** (296-373), from whom it takes its name. Like the other previously named creeds, the Athanasian Creed is a profession of the Christian faith; but it is also a full-fledged theology lesson, which is why it is the longest of the standard Christian creeds. Reading the Athanasian Creed privately or with your family is a good way to gain a deeper understanding of the mystery of the **Blessed Trinity**.


